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Area Health Care Costs are Increasing but are Closer to the Midwest Average than Previous Studies According to Greater Milwaukee Business Foundation on Health

Milwaukee...The Greater Milwaukee Business Foundation on Health, Inc. (GMBFH), known for its research on the cost, efficiency and quality of health care in the greater Milwaukee area, has released the results of its third overall cost study at a meeting of providers, insurers, business and community leaders on Tuesday, November 3rd. It concludes that Southeast Wisconsin healthcare commercial premium costs are 9% higher than the average cost in the Midwest.

"This is a vast improvement since our study of 2000 data when we were 55% higher and the study of 2003 data when we were 39% higher than our colleagues in comparable Midwest states," said Ron Dix, the Foundation's Executive Director.

The two main authors of the study are consulting firms Mercer and Milliman.

The findings are based on the analysis of 2006 and 2007 combined employer and employee health care premium costs of commercial health plan members under the age of 65, and includes residents of Milwaukee, Waukesha, Racine, Ozaukee, Kenosha, Walworth, and Washington counties, and represents more than \$1.7 billion in health care costs from approximately 450,000 members and dependents for each year. These figures include the cost for medical, prescription drug, mental health, vision, hearing, etc., but not dental, and correspond to comparable figures from Illinois, Indiana, Ohio, Michigan, Minnesota, Iowa, North Dakota, South Dakota, Missouri, Kansas and Nebraska.

The study authors have taken great pains to ensure the comparisons in this study are consistent with those presented in the Foundation's two previous studies on this subject.

"Although the results of this study are more positive than the previous two, the demographics of our employees, higher provider payment levels and richer benefit plan designs in Southeast Wisconsin are the primary reasons our costs are higher than in other Midwest states," Dix continued.

"These findings clearly underline the complexity of the problem and that there are no single solutions," said Dix.

Some of the factors listed in the study as contributing to these higher than average costs include:

- This area had a higher average age of participants (43 vs. 41) than the others.
- Southeast Wisconsin employers offered slightly richer plan designs than comparative plans in the other states.
- Provider payments in Southeast Wisconsin are 9% higher than the Midwest average.

A reason that helped to keep this level at 9% is the utilization and services mix in this area was 6% below the Midwest average. During the last study they were estimated to be 2% above the Midwest average.

Overall, provider payment levels were 9% higher than the Midwest average. Hospital payment levels in Southeastern Wisconsin were slightly higher than Midwest averages. Physician payment levels were 24% higher than Midwest averages.
